Pastor's Column

The Church's calendar is divided up into seasons. By "seasons" I mean *liturgical* seasons, not climatic season. Advent, Christmastide, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, are some of the liturgical seasons that make up the Christian calendar. And then there is that oddly named season that comes right after Pentecost—the season we are in right now. It's simply called "Ordinary Time."

While lacking the excitement, drama, or special holidays of the other seasons, "ordinary time" is where most of us spend most of our lives. Most of our lives are spent doing ordinary things: taking care of our family members, cooking meals, going to work, mowing the lawn, doing homework, washing our clothes, attending meetings, going to the store, engaging in our hobbies, etc. These seemingly mundane parts of our lives are places where we live out, day by day, our faith. And we pause in this season to recall that God blesses these ordinary parts of our lives.

During the month of August, we want to celebrate our "ordinary" lives and the way God is known in and through these activities. During the weeks of August, worshipers are invited to bring to the service some item used in the course of their ordinary lives: a spatula, a golf club, an umbrella, a dish cloth, a fishing rod, a garden tool, a mop, a pair of sneakers, etc. During the service we will offer a blessing for these items and the way they help us live faithfully and joyfully the life God has given us. Then, during the week, these items will be constructed into a special "sculpture" on the chancel.

We hope that you will be willing to let us temporarily borrow your item for the enrichment of our worship life. And don't forget: please mark your item with your name so that you can receive it back once August is over and our sculpture comes down.

May God bless our ordinary times so that we may serve our God and one another extraordinarily well.

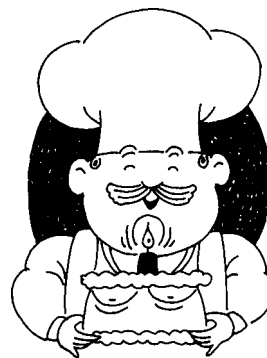

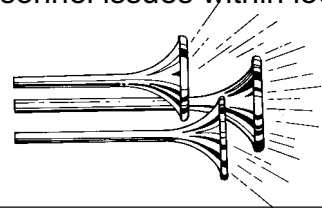

Congratulations, John!

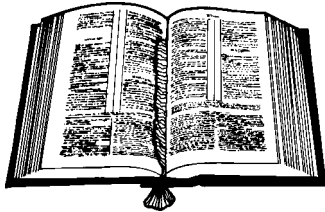

Monetary donations are also accepted. Checks can be given to Elaine Swaine or mailed to

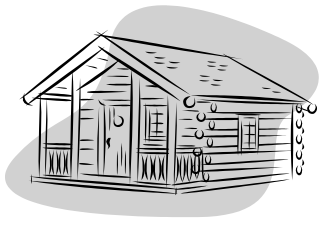

Confirmation Class Essay

The essay was to answer the question *“Why is being part of a Christian Community important?”* or *“Why can’t I just be a good Christian on my own?”*

Living in a Christian community and believing in God is a very separate idea than believing in God, but not sharing your beliefs with anyone. The ideas are very separate because when choosing not to share your beliefs with others, you become very isolated. You have no one there to help you when you need it, and you are not there to help someone else when they need it. When you live in a Christian community, you are sharing your thoughts about God with people who accept and love you.

Living in a community of Christians is also important because it helps you make good decisions. As said in Luke Chapter 3, verse 10-11, “And the people asked him, saying, What shall we do then? He answereth and saith unto them, "He that hath two coats, let him impart to him that hath none; and he that hath meat, let him do likewise.” This is telling us that when someone has nothing or close to nothing, and we have plenty, we should share. This section of the Bible is telling us to share with those in need even if you don’t want to, because it is the right thing to do. When you surround yourself with others who support you, and believe in the same thing you do, it is much easier to make good decisions.

One last positive aspect of living in a Christian community is that it helps you do the right thing even when you don’t want to. As Jesus says over and over in the Bible “Love your enemies,” that is a hard thing to do. No one wants to be kind to those they hate, because in most cases they have done something to you to make you feel that way. When you have people around you who also believe, they can help you get through it and do the right thing. Living in a Christian community is important because it gives you the support you need to make the right decisions and live out the word of God. The idea of living in this type of community will help me in the future because it will help me to do the right thing, and be someone that God is proud of.
